Exploring the Chung Report and Wichita's Future at WPC luncheon

A bank senior vice president, Katie Grover works hard at changing images in the banking business and the face of Wichita. Grover is an editor with TheChungReport.com, a content producing website that aims to engage, inspire and inform Team Wichita.

The Chung Report was inspired by the work of data analyst James Chung and his company Reach Advisors. In shining a light on the issues facing Wichita, Chung created the impetus for a real conversation about the future of this city. The goal is to make this site one of the places where exploration of these issues can continue.

Grover also serves as senior vice president and marketing director at Fidelity Bank. In her role, Grover oversees all aspects of marketing from strategy to execution for a bank that spans three markets and has exceeded \$2 billion in assets. Most notably, she directed the launch and continued efforts of BRAVELY ONWARD, an extremely innovative (and bold), multilayered rebranding initiative.

Prior to Fidelity, Grover was the director of marketing at Heartspring. During her career, Grover was honored as the 2010 Wichita Chapter of the American Marketing Association's Nonprofit Marketer of the Year as well as the 2013 Financial Marketer of the Year. She was named to the Wichita Business Journal's 40 Under 40 class of 2011 and the Chamber's Leadership Wichita class of 2015.

Grover received her bachelor's degree in communication studies from Bethany College in Lindsborg, Kansas. She is a member of the American Marketing Association Wichita Chapter and a past board member for the Kansas Chapter of the Public Relations Society of America. She sits on the board of directors for the WSU Tech Foundation and the board of trustees for Leadership Wichita. She enjoys volunteering her time with Special Olympics, the Miracle League of Wichita and Earhart Environmental Magnet Elementary School. She lives in Riverside with her husband, Travis, and children Lillian and Harrison.

Free workshop Nov. 17 to address new NFPW contest rules

WPC has set up a free contest workshop for Nov. 17, 1-3 p.m., Watermark Books. It will be open to members and nonmembers to share contest tips with them as well as working hands-on to navigate the submission system. Join NFPW board member Gwen Larson as she gives a tutorial on how to enter the upcoming contest. Participants can also get some tips and advice for successful submissions. The workshop is free and open to both professional and nonmembers of NFPW and the Kansas Professional Communicators. Lawson, also KPC vice

president, was actively involved at the recent NFPW conference in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania.



The annual contest has undergone several changes, ranging from the types of categories to the requirements within continuing categories. All entry

submissions and payments will be handled online in the upcoming contest, too.

Other major changes include the contest being open Oct. 1 to accept entries, as well as very early deadlines for submissions. The early-bird deadline is Jan. 9, which will save you \$25 on your first contest entry. Final deadline for book entries is Jan. 15, while the final deadline for all other entries is Jan. 22.

Nonmembers and professional members of NFPW and its affiliates are eligible to enter work completed during the 2018 calendar year. Entries will be submitted to the state affiliate level first (Kansas Professional Communicators), with first-place winners who are professional members moving on to compete in the NFPW contest. Nonmembers who place first in the state contest may choose to become a professional member so that their entry can move on to the national contest.

Slate of new officers to be presented at Nov. 7 meeting

Elections for executive positions on the WPC board will be held at the Nov. 7 meeting. The following slate has been nominated and will be voted on as a whole: president – Amy Geiszler-Jones, vice president – Adrienne Churchill, treasurer – Becky Funke and secretary – Darcy Gray. Other board positions will be appointed by the new president.

Please make plans to attend the Nov. 7 meeting, which doubles as our membership meeting plus fantastic monthly program. We will start the buffet line promptly at 11:30 a.m. and get the meeting underway around 11:40 a.m. to allow plenty of time for our presenter Katie Grover, editor of The Chung Report and senior vice president and director of marketing with Fidelity Bank.

To keep things moving along, we'll dispense with doing introductions and raffle drawings, and use that time for the elections, a vote on whether to accept the amended bylaws you'll get more on that in the upcoming November nwsbrfs), and a status report on the group's financials and actions for the year.

Update on WPC bylaws to go to membership vote

WPC bylaws, in place since the incorporation of the organization formerly known as Wichita Press Women, need occasional review. This year's bylaws committee was headed by past president Shannon Littlejohn and included current president Amy Geiszler-Jones and at-large board members Anne Welsbacher and Brian Whepley. The newly edited bylaws were reviewed by members of the WPC board of directors and unanimously approved for the membership vote on Nov. 7.

Modifications include:

- A change in Article II from Objectives to Mission and an updated mission statement.
- A merging of applicable membership information from Article IV, Fiscal Year and Dues, with Article III. Article IV was eliminated. To be in line with KPC and NFPW policies, the setting of membership dues and specials is handled by the WPC board.
- An update of Article VIII (now Article VII), Meetings, Section 1 to not specify monthly meetings to allow for a variety of programming.

- The addition of an appendix for further guidance on Article X (now Article IX), regarding the duties of elected and appointed officers.
- A general grammar and style cleanup of language.
